In 1994, she graduated from Brown University with a B.A. in American Civilization & Race Relations.

BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS FOR JULY AND AUGUST 2008

On the conservation front the Board approved a position letter on the proposed Great Salt Lake selenium standard proposed by the State of Utah DWQ. GSLA's position is the proposed standard is not conservative enough. GSLA will be submitting that letter to DWQ during the current comment period. We would encourage all GSLA members or anyone concerned with conservation to visit our website read our letter and the other information associated with this issue. The Board would also encourage all GSLA members to comment on your own behalf during the comment period.

The Board has changed the responsibilities for the Treasurer's position to reflect the recommendation of the auditor and the outgoing Treasurer Kathy Waddell. The Board appreciated Kathy's presence and efforts during the last two years and will miss her. The Board welcomed and approved appointing David Shen to the Board as the new Treasurer. Another change to our financial portfolio was to diversify our accounts such that not all of our assets were with one bank. This change will protect us incase of bank failure and our assets will be covered by FDIC insurance.

The Board is energized by our new Executive Director. He is very active and provided the Board with a long list of items he has been pursuing the last two months. He will be organizing the dedication of our Jordan River project for next spring. GSLA members should consider attending the dedication and stay tuned for more details.

The Board also approved upgrading our internet services at the office and for our members. In the near future our office will have information technology appropriate for this century. The upgrade should allow the Executive Director and others working in the office the opportunity to perform tasks in a timely manner with appropriate tools.

Finally the Board is looking forward to a spectacular Gala. Great silent auction items have been received and more are forthcoming. The gala committee has a great speaker and some great music lined up. Please be sure to respond positively to your Gala invitation that accompanies this issue of your Pelican.

BRUCE'S BLOG : AWARENESS AND CONSCIOUSNESS

One of the opportunities that comes with the privilege of occupying the GSLA Executive Director position is the chance to express some of my insights and thoughts in writing every couple of months.

Lately I've been participating in some GSLA events (Basin & Range, Brighton Bird Count), assisting June at our information booth at the July 24th expo at Tracy Aviary, and visiting some of the existing and potential preservation sites in our area (our Jordan River wildlife habitat restoration project, Nature Conservancy's Layton Marsh, the Farmington Bay Nature Center, various areas along the rest of the Jordan River). I'm heartened by how much progress has been made just in the past decade. It is striking to me how much influence we have, and can have, as individuals and as an organization.

Perhaps the greatest influence we can have is in simply making other people aware; of making humans conscious of these birds, these sentient beings with whom we share the available living space here in our GSLA area. We do it of course by the examples we set, by the kind of lives we lead and the choices we make, which are observed by those with whom we come in contact.

But, even more proactively, we do it by our participation in birding and conservation activities. With us in Jean and Ray's Brighton Count group, for example, were people who had never been birding before. Our enthusiasm rubbed off and they were excited, thrilled, at being able to identify some of the birds we saw. You remember that feeling! From now on they will forever be conscious of the birds and wildlife they come in contact with.

At Frank Howe's B&R Bird Ecology field trip, when the mother Meadowlark flew off her nest virtually right at our feet, we felt in our gut her crucial need for the basic necessities for survival of shelter, food and water, and undisturbed space to live in. Recently I gave a presentation on birds and birding and led a field trip up at Solitude. I tried to help these outdoor recreationists and summer condo dwellers be aware that the birds there are conscious living individuals sharing that living space, not just colorful entertainment or a set of identifying field marks; and that they depend on the good graces of humans like them for survival.

Everything you do with Great Salt Lake Audubon helps make other people aware and conscious of birds, and of the essential need to conserve the remaining critical wildlife habitat spaces in our area.

Join GSL Audubon for a morning birding the Salt Lake International Center Migrant Trap. In less than a year, nearly 150 species have been tallied at this location that looks unlike any other migrant trap in the west. Large warehouses and vacant lots, lined with cottonwoods, Russian olives, poplars, and other decorative trees. Hedgerows, lines of willows, and numerous patches of thick understory, as well as several ponds, canals, and weedy patches, help to create an oasis on the south end of the Great Salt Lake that attracts southbound migrants by the flock in the fall. We should be treated to warblers, vireos, sparrows, and a handful of other passerine migrants. Tanagers, orioles, grosbeaks, buntings, woodpeckers, and hawks are also often found meandering through the trees. We will cover many of the most productive areas and give those unfamiliar with the area a crash course in birding this extensive and somewhat incredible urban jungle! Plan on meeting in the SE corner of the Shopko Parking Lot in Sugarhouse at 7:30am and birding the IC for most of the morning. Food and water are available on site at several restaurants and a gas station. If time permits and participants are willing we may visit several other south shore locations for shorebirds, waterfowl and other fall migrants. We will plan on being back to Sugarhouse no later than 3:00pm. Call Tim (440-3035) if you have any questions.

Alan Weisman will be in Salt Lake City on September 30 as part of the Wallace Stegner Center's Lecture Series. Weisman is the author of *The New York Times* bestseller *The World Without Us*.
